It meets quarterly, and accepts comments by the public at the beginning of each meeting.



Watershed Management Plan to Receive Update

The Action Plan Subcommittee of the Carmel River Task Force convened on Friday, January 17th to discuss progress made on an update to the 2005 Watershed Assessment and the 2007 Action Plan. The revised plan will work two-fold to characterize existing watershed conditions and to identify and prioritize activities most beneficial to the watershed as a whole. It is intended to be a practical tool to guide watershed coordinators, resource managers, policy makers and local stakeholders in protecting and restoring water resources.

To accompany the Carmel River Watershed Plan, CRWC intern Brittany Ajroud and CSUMB Research Coordinator Gabriela Alberola are building an active database of projects and programs in the watershed that includes a periodic status update and contact information for identified project managers. The database will contribute to the publication of an annual report providing a snapshot of the activity taking place within the watershed as well as an itemization of the more than 50 projects aimed at restoring the health of the Carmel River.

Good News for the South-Central Steelhead

At the end of 2013, the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) released a final Recovery Plan for the distinct population segment of South-Central Steelhead. The plan



represents an ambitious effort to restore steelhead runs to historic levels in several major watersheds, including the Carmel River.

The largest threat facing South-Central Steelhead is the presence of dams and diversions that alter stream flow characteristics and prevent steelhead from accessing historic spawning and rearing habitat. In order to restore lost connectivity between the ocean and upstream habitat, the Recovery Plan identifies the removal or physical modification of dams and major barriers to passage along with the restoration of stream flows as high-priority actions. In addition to these steps, a targeted recovery strategy requires site-specific studies and monitoring programs.

For steelhead in the Carmel River, three major dams impede access to approximately 50% of the watershed. Removal projects are already underway for the San Clemente and Old River dams, while a feasibility study is being completed on either removing Los Padres dam or improving steelhead passage. Even with all the good news, steelhead face an uphill battle – 2012 fish counts estimated 470 wild adult steelhead

spawned in the Carmel River while a population exceeding 4,000 is needed for NMFS to consider delisting.
